You should be able to see them safely but remember to keep a 2-metre distance from anyone outside your household, and not to form groups that break current government guidelines. If the trail is too much for you to do in one go, why not do it over two evenings?

People were living in darkness because they were not friends with their creator God, who loves the world and is the giver of light. So a very long time ago, God made a promise to one old man Abraham. He was going to bless Abraham with lots of chil-

dren and grandchildren: as many in his family as the stars in the sky!

How many Christmas windows can you see on this theme? Do you recognise any Christmas carols? Would you like to sing one of them as you walk?

Write down the 1st mystery letter here: Then the Lord took Abram outside and said to him, "Look up into the sky and count the stars if you can. That's how many descendants you will have!" Genesis 15:5

God made the stars. God loves us and wants lots of friends.

Take care crossing Warminster Road, turn left and find a footpath on your right down to The Chestertons. NB: There are some steps.

Mary was a young girl looking forward to marrying Joseph. Suddenly she saw a very scary angel who told her not to be afraid. He was bringing good news from God, that God had chosen Mary to have a baby who would be King for ever. His name would be JESUS which means God Rescues.

See if you can see Mary and the angels in any windows around Holcombe Close. Write down the 2nd

mystery letter here:

"For the word of God will never fail." Luke 1:37

An angel surprised Mary and said she was going to have a VERY special baby.

Joseph thought Mary must have been cheating on him so he was going to finish with her. But an angel appeared to him in a dream and said,

"do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit... you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

How do you think Joseph would have felt when he had this dream?

3rd mystery letter:

Do you know any carols about this?



4th mystery letter:



And because Joseph was a descendant of King David, he had to go to Bethlehem in Judea, David's ancient home. Luke 2:4 Up Down Lane can you see some Christmas windows?



Mary's baby was born and she put him in a manger. Around the top end of Devonshire Road are some windows on both sides of the main road.

In the fields outside Bethlehem some shepherds were sleeping rough and taking turns to keep an eye on their sheep. They were used to dangerous wild animals trying to steal the sheep. They were ready for a fight like that but they were absolutely terrified by the surprise they got this night. Another angel! He started by saying what angels always seem to say first: "Don't be afraid." Then he told them some amazing news. They were the first to hear it but it was for everybody and it was good news. The Rescuer-King they were waiting for had been born! How would they know this was true? If they went into town they would see a strange sight: a baby in an animal feeding box! 10 000 angels then filled the sky, celebrating and saying how great God is and how lucky the people were. So when it went quiet, of course the shepherds hurried off to check it out for themselves.

Meanwhile, in some distant Eastern country, some stargazers were mapping out the movement of stars and planets and reading interpretations into them about what was happening on earth. Now normally that kind of thing is a load of nonsense, but in this special case God used it to get them looking for his special king. So they set off on the long journey to Judea, where they went into the capital city, Jerusalem.

8th mystery letter:



spotted a special star in the sky and set out on a journey to where it pointed them.


