

St Nicholas Church Church Close Bathampton BA2 6TU Website: www.stnicholasbathampton.org.uk **Background:** St. Nicholas PCC has the responsibility of co-operation with the Revd. Jonty Frith, Incumbent, in promoting our Mission Statement that "We are a church focused on Jesus so that we love one another, serve the whole parish and touch the world."

Charitable Status: The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC is a charity exempted from registration with the Charity Commission. The appointment of PCC members is governed by and set out in the Church representation rules.

Bankers: Current account held with National Westminster Bank, Bath. Deposit and Investment accounts held with the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England (CFB), London.

Independent Examiner: Andrew Morrison

Financial Review: The full financial report is presented separately.

Reserves Policy: It is PCC policy to balance general income and expenditure each year and to invest our fund balances with the CBF Church of England Deposit Fund. The PCC policy is to maintain, if possible, a balance of unrestricted funds equal to six month's unrestricted payments to cover any emergency that may arise.

The PCC has three Charitable Trusts which donate money to the work of St. Nicholas Church, for which the rector and churchwardens act as Trustees:

- The Barlow Trust for the benefit of the sick and poor of the parish.
- The Ramsbottom Trust for the maintenance of the churchyard.
- The Rhodes Trust for Sunday School work in the parish.

PCC Members October 2020-2021

The appointment of PCC members is governed by and set out in the Church Representation Rules. Most members of the PCC are elected, but Churchwardens and Diocesan and Deanery Synod members are *ex officio*. All elected PCC members are volunteers.

Benefice Administrator: Kay Rees 10 hours per week (until Nov. 2020) Hannah Findlay (voluntary from Nov. 2020) PCC Review of the Year: PCC met formally six times during 2020, with all but the first being virtual meetings online via Zoom. Besides the regular items (including finances, safeguarding and reports from subcommittees), the PCC has discussed a variety of matters. Considerable time was spent considering issues related to lockdown restrictions on the opening/closing of churches for private prayer/public worship and how to deliver live-streamed online services via YouTube and/or Zoom; this included authorization of expenditure to upgrade audio and video facilities to enable livestreaming from the church building. In January we considered aspects of the CEEC booklet 'Human Sexuality: thinking it through biblically'. New arrangements for churchyard maintenance and the purchase of a new cooker for the kitchen were approved in May, and in July a proposal to replace the current pew bibles with the NIV 2011 edition was agreed (although not yet enacted). We approved the appointment of an Administrator and the suggestion of Families Outreach Worker. In November, a proposal that St Nicholas should become a Partner Church within the South West Gospel Partnership was discussed, but it was felt that it was not the right time to be taking this decision. Finance: 2020 was an unusual year. Because of Covid the church was closed for a large part of the year resulting in income from church collections, the wall box, Miller Room hire and church activities being reduced. The "Bridge" magazine was unable to continue and the advertisers were offered refunds. Stewardship giving increased by approximately 6%. A legacy of £5,000 was received. The Parish Share was £5,300 less than in 2019. Running expenses were reduced. A new cooker was purchased. £3,831 was sent to charities. Repairs were carried out on the church as a result of the quinquennial report. *Rita Warboys*

Churchwardens' Report: At the start of 2020, when Anna took over from Sarah Harris, there was little indication of what was to come and the wardens

were busy working on the usual statistics for mission and parish share survey tasks. Ian Williams had also started to draft a practical handbook for wardens and sidespeople.

All of this came to a juddering halt in March, when we moved everything online because of the first national lockdown. The potential irony of our theme verse for 2020 (Let us not give up meeting together...) was a helpful spur to make sure that our online church was a place where real fellowship, encouragement and worship could take place. Thinking back to those first few months, we're hugely grateful to Hugh Cornes for all the work he did in helping us to get up and running on YouTube, and to Samuel and Harry Frith for running the livestream from the vicarage for St Mary's and St Nicholas', respectively. We continued with YouTube services right through the summer months, before moving to a digital/physical hybrid (phygital?) in November and December. Again, the technical obstacles to this new phase were significant and we are hugely grateful to Harry Frith for all the time he put in to getting things running smoothly and to operating the live stream almost every week from October to January.

At the APCM in 2019 (remember the days before the pandemic?), Ian Williams had indicated his intention to step down in 2020. This was delayed slightly by the lockdown, but Paul Bryant was officially elected as churchwarden at the APCM in October 2020. Paul has also joined the Fabric Committee and has been involved with various projects in and around the building.

While many of our activities were put on hold for most of 2020, there has been plenty to keep the wardens entertained, including the need to run effectively online. We've set up a mailing list and an online system for the prayer updates which would normally be communicated via the service sheet, and we've updated the church website to make it easier to navigate. The next challenges are an update to our file storage/sharing system that is compatible with the new way of working. We're grateful to Hannah Findlay for stepping into the Administrator role and helping with the organisational side of things behind the scenes. Anna Young and Paul Bryant **Rector's Report:** "Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together... but let us encourage one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching." When we started 2020 with Hebrews 10:24-25 as our Theme Verses, the Lord alone knew how we would need, and benefit from, that exhortation. Never before has our ability to meet together as church been so tested. And yet in God's goodness we have been able to survive as a living church.

Our ability to meet together and encourage one another was frustratingly restricted, but the gift of technology saw all of us quickly getting used to things we had never done before. Some signed up to an email mailing list for the first time. Some had their first experience of watching YouTube. I'm not sure any of us had even heard of Zoom, but it soon became second nature for so many, including those for whom "wireless" used to mean the radio around which the family would gather! Some of us started speaking to a camera as if it were a person, and stopped feeling as though that was a strange thing to do.

No doubt everybody in the world can look back to how they responded to the pandemic and think of some things that they would have done differently, with hindsight. There were some missed opportunities. Perhaps we might have got into practical service of our neighbours in need more effectively; we always seemed to find there were more offers of help than requests for help and no doubt that left some people suffering needlessly because we didn't manage to find out about their needs, or were not proactive enough in facilitating and organising appropriate safe contact to ameliorate loneliness and strengthen fellowship.

But there were God-given opportunities taken as well. Some people have stepped up into extraordinary levels of service (you know who you are and God sees and will reward). I have found a growing sense of

unity in the church despite the testing time which might so easily have driven wedges between us. In the past we have had the luxury of choosing the style of service that suits us, perhaps avoiding what we don't like. In a sense that option has been even more available as churches all over the country, and even the world, went online and we could freely visit any one we pleased. But still the rootedness of local community in the body of Christ drew us back together and we valued one another and learned to bear with one another in new ways. Texting into a livestream service, sometimes with serious points and sometimes with silly games, all helped us express our church family life together, even when we were all locked into our homes. I have been so impressed to see younger members, older members, those who like old hymns and those who like new songs, those who prefer a formal liturgical style and those who would rather go off-piste, bearing with one another, faithfully continuing to tune in, and growing in family love. Thank you, my church family. I thank God for you.

We have even seen a higher-than-normal number of new people added to our number: praise God. Sadly, there have also been some that have drifted away – for a range of reasons, some of whom we have neglected – and, as we come out of lockdown and start to meet in person again, there needs to be a whole-church effort to seek the lost sheep and bring them back into the fold. God's goodness to us is also seen in the church finances as he has kept us afloat; having spent a good few weeks thinking about the Generosity Project we need to grow in the grace of blessing others generously.

In our services we continued to feed on God's word, especially through series covering Isaiah 13-26, Matthew 13-18, Romans 12-16, Philippians, and 1 Peter 1-2.

Repeated changes in the situation, in and out of lockdown, with all the planning and effort needed to get technology working for us and to

keep the church "meeting together", took its toll. I got too drawn into doing too much myself and not making enough use of others' gifts. By the end of 2020 I was exhausted and this no doubt contributed to my lengthy illness in the first quarter of 2021. But overall I can – and I pray you too will – look back on 2020 with thankfulness:

Oh, the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable his judgments, and his paths beyond tracing out!
'Who has known the mind of the Lord? Or who has been his counsellor?'
'Who has ever given to God, that God should repay them?'
For from him and through him and for him are all things. To him be the glory for ever! Amen. (Romans 11:33-36) Jonty Frith

It has been a tough year for all of us with Covid, but the illness and now the retirement of Bishop Peter, on medical grounds, has added much work to the Diocesan team, under Bishop Ruth.

The appointment of Sharon KIndleysides, as Chief Executive, replacing Nick May, is exciting, but that has also placed strain upon the structure and its work.

I also sit upon the Bishop's Council and as a member of the Audit and Risk Management Group. I find the work on both very rewarding, as both teams work to assist the Clergy and Administration, to deliver the Diocesan Vision and Strategy.

The future, however, requires prayer from all of us. *Phil Edge*

Deanery Synod: After many years of service, the Area Dean (Rev Matthew Frankum) and Lay Dean (Jeremy Key-Pugh) both stepped down in the Autumn and were replaced by Rev Stephen Girling and Pippa Page, respectively. Stephen Girling spoke after his election of "'Shaping a culture of Prayerfulness, Hospitality and Innovation", and of working to develop this culture in our respective churches. This vision has led to the creation of a Deanery Mission and Pastoral Group, which comprises lay and clergy members from each 'sector' of the city and surrounding villages to "watch for God's working within and without the church in that sector" and thus enable the Deanery Synod to have a big picture view of what is happening around the area. *Anna Young and Tim Laver*

Worship, Teaching and Equipping

Worship Committee: When lockdown started we had to make some quick decisions without knowing what we were doing. Getting a livestream up and running on the very first Sunday, 22nd March, proved worthwhile with an exciting momentum, despite the inevitable amateurism and technical hitches. Using YouTube rather than Zoom was judged better at the time to keep the barrier to attendance (for churchgoers and newcomers) as low as possible, and we were visited by some that would not normally come into the building.

Music was a challenge, but Hugh did a great work sourcing suitable recordings and obtaining copyright permission. Our professional organist Adam, who has been paid a fee per service rather than a salary and so was not eligible for furlough, was very little used, and it seemed right to pay him a proportion of his lost income when he did not play, which PCC decided to phase out on review. On return to the building with no singing, Margaret voluntarily provided beautiful piano.

We did not attempt to share the Lord's Supper virtually, although we have made use of the "Spiritual Communion" liturgy; what a joy it will be to break that fast when we finally get back to church together!

Anna, Tim, Nigel, and Ian have all risen to the challenge of leading services online wonderfully. Margaret resourced the service leaders

with very helpful suggestions of songs, readings and other ideas. In this she was continuing, and expanding on, a very helpful pattern that had been provided by Jan Williams and Sylvia Perry for many years.

Getting back into the building in the autumn was a mixed blessing; it took a great deal of trial and error, including the removal of new unsuitable cameras, before we reached a high standard of online experience for those unable to come onsite for services.

Men's Group: The "Men's Group" meet from 7:30 pm to 9:30 pm on the third Monday of each month. Before lockdown we enjoyed meeting in each other's homes. Since then we have been meeting on Zoom, which does not suit all our membership. Currently we have 12 members; about half attend the Zoom meetings regularly.

In addition to coffee and biscuits, pre-lockdown, the menu comprises topical questions provided by members. Most questions are not concerned with religious or spiritual matters, although they do creep in from time to time and can result in vigorous discussion. International, national and local topics, great and small, are raised.

We are a group of friends with a range of views, experience, knowledge and skills, where we learn from one another. Hopefully, it also tends to act as a way into the church community for those new to the church, and like 'glue' for those who might otherwise drift away. The meetings can also act as a sounding board for those uncertain about their beliefs or what the church is there for, and it is a mission field for those who believe in such needs. Jonty Frith **Pastoral Visiting Team:** The Pastoral Visiting Team aim to visit members of St Nicholas who can no longer attend church through ill-health or disability, and those going through difficult times, such as illness or bereavement. We also visit people in the Parish who come to our attention and who have indicated they would like a pastoral visit. Where appropriate we share a bible reading and pray with those visited. We rely on church members to let us know of those who might need to be visited. Our Church is a caring community and we are aware that other members visit too.

Due to the lockdown, for the most part of 2020 we were unable to visit church members in person. Instead, we made contact with those we would normally visit by telephone, or the occasional letter or a wave outside their house. We look forward to meeting people face to face as soon as we are permitted to do so.

One of the most disappointing impacts of lockdown was the cessation of our efforts, started in 2019, to grow St Nicholas towards being a Dementia Friendly Church. We started by providing Friendship Teas in the Miller Room for the carers of those with dementia and long-term carers, and those who they cared for. We would love to start these again when we can.

Outreach

Engaging Children and Youth

Junior Church: Junior Church has, on the whole, been thriving on Zoom, despite the inevitable technical issues which come up. There is a lot to be grateful and thankful for.



We now have 3 groups: 4-8year olds, 9-11 year olds, and secondary school age.

A rota of parents, along with Anne-Marie and Molly, take it in turns to run the youngest group. From March through to December this group had up to 11 members, but that has reduced since January 2021 and we're back down to our regular attendees, with others who join in from time to time.

The 9-11 year olds are a group of 3 or 4 boys who are great fun and are led by Becky every week. We are currently undertaking a whole Bible overview which is showing the boys how all the stories in the Bible fit together and how they point to Jesus, even all the old testament ones.

The secondary school group are also doing a Bible overview and are led each week by Samuel.

We're really looking forward to meeting together again in person, but the need to socially distance, and the fact that we now have 3 groups, will make that quite challenging in our building. We also desperately need some more leaders/helpers when we're able to meet back together in the church building again. Especially men! We have lots of boys in the older groups, and it's great for them to have male role models to look up to and get to know. For safe-guarding, we need to have at least two adults with each group, so we need twice as many leaders as we currently have, and Samuel will be going to university in the autumn so we'll need a leader for his group too. It would be a step backwards to return to 2 groups, and I don't think it's good for the older children to have their parents running the group, so please consider if you can help us. We're absolutely delighted to have these families at St Nicks, but we need volunteers at Junior Church. You don't have to run a session, you can just be the extra adult we need for safeguarding. The children are fantastic, so I'm sure you'd find it a beneficial experience! Becky Frith

Mini Club: We were a thriving group before lockdown, but haven't

been able to meet at all since last March. Just before lockdown, one of our mums did Christianity Explored with Jonty and Becky, and two of the miniclub families have come fairly often to Junior church on Zoom during lockdown. Both of these things are very encouraging and remind us that while we want to provide a lovely,



friendly, accessible group to pre-schoolers and their carers on a Wednesday morning (when we're allowed to), our greatest desire is to introduce them to Jesus. Becky Frith

Support Ministries

The Fabric Committee: The Committee is responsible for the day- today upkeep of the church and churchyard and for the progress of the repairs and professional surveys listed in the Quinquennial Inspection reports. Work is carried out using in-house effort where possible but calling in contractor assistance where appropriate and when funding is available.

The Fabric Committee has a team of hardworking and professional members who individually look after separate aspects of our work according to their expertise. We need further members with the necessary skills to look after electrical and plumbing issues, for which we currently use contractors.

The key effort during 2020 was addressing the recommendations of the 2019 Quinquennial Inspection report against the costed forward work programme for the next four years to keep the Church in good condition.

The Coronavirus Pandemic was seen as an opportunity to accelerate the work programme whilst the church was closed. This approach has been most successful in addressing all the recommendations, with completion due by May 2021. All the specialist works were competitively contracted and the balance of works were carried out by in-house effort.

The Glass Doors project was deferred to a post-Pandemic time when the fund-raising effort may be more favourably received by the Australian community. David Lascelles



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
